Obituary of the late Farzana Khan

Farzana bid her final farewell to this heavenly earth on 24 February 2021 at the Netcare N1 City Hospital, after her resilient battle with cancer. Farzana was the first born to her parents Mr. and Mrs Phiroz Khan on the 23 of June 1981 (39).

She matriculated from Pietermaritzburg Girls High in 1998. Farzana enrolled to study for her Bachelors of Pharmacy Degree at the University of Port Elizabeth where she completed her degree Cum Laude and was the recipient of the prestigious Golden Key Award.

Farzana served her pharmacy community service at Musina Hospital in Limpopo and qualified as a pharmacist in 2002. With a strong sense of higher purpose thinking to serve the citizens of the country, Farzana made a conscious and principled choice to work in the field of regulatory compliance. It was her conviction that her skills, knowledge and talents could best be utilised as a servant of the people, protecting their basic health rights and interests. As such, she joined the Medical Control Council of the Department of Health in 2005.

Farzana was instrumental through her tireless efforts and commitment to ensure that all pharmaceutical companies complied with both international and national regulatory standards. Farzana headed the National Adverse Drug Events Monitoring Centre in Cape Town, which was later incorporated into SAHPRA.

Farzana served in several government task teams of the Department of Health and represented South Africa in international conferences and seminars. She was honored to represent South Africa as a delegate at the World Health Organisation conferences in India, China and Uppsala, Sweden.

In advancing her passion for service and truth to the public, Farzana enrolled for a BA LLB Degree with the University of South Africa.

Farzana is survived by her husband, Faheem and their children Yaseen & Waheeda.
